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OUR PURPOSE:

Darebin Information, Volunteer & Resource Service (DIVRS) is a not-for-profit volunteer-driven organisation that delivers services and programs to vulnerable populations in Darebin, reducing financial stress, social isolation and barriers to accessing community information.

DIVRS PROVIDES:

- Resources and support to low income Darebin residents who suffer from financial stress or crisis.
 Our aim is to strengthen their financial independence and increase resilience.
- Programs and services that advance the education and skills development of disadvantaged Darebin residents.
- A volunteer service that promotes social inclusion and strong networks creating opportunities for participation in the City of Darebin.
- Local capabilities and knowledge to address disadvantage, promote resilience, and contribute to the development of social policies and services that impact on the residents of our community.

CHAIRPERSON'S REVIEW:

On behalf of the DIVRS Committee of Governance I present to you the 2019 Annual Report.

Over the past two years we have been very fortunate to have the services of Frances Trimboli, Executive Officer for DIVRS since September 2017. Frances has worked extremely hard to transform the organisation and take it to a whole new level. Much of her work has involved being a strong advocate for DIVRS as well as playing an important role in building valuable partnerships. A lot of what has been achieved is going to ensure that DIVRS is securing its future as a progressive, resilient and relevant organisation in the City of Darebin.

Many in the community are already well aware that this organisation provides an invaluable service to the most vulnerable in our community with groceries through the Emergency Relief Program and fresh produce from the Urban Food Program. Additionally, we have an important partnership with La Trobe University whereby Nursing students assist our clients with basic health assessments and advice.

The DIVRS site is an extremely busy place and a hive of activity during the week. Led by Frances, other capable and hard working staff members and Program Coordinators ensure that the days run smoothly, and any issues are dealt with effectively with satisfactory outcomes. The staff and volunteers serve our clients efficiently always with respect and compassion.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank all our partners and funders for their generosity and support over the past twelve months. These include Good Shepherd Microfinance, Vic Roads, Latrobe University and CISVic. The Committee of Governance would especially like to thank the City of Darebin, our major funding body, for their ongoing support over a number of years. We value this important relationship, which is now stronger than it has ever been. Frances has been very diligent in her communication with Council to strengthen this relationship. The Committee also thanks Ged Kearney MP, Federal Member for Cooper for her support and advocacy.

The support of other Members of the Committee makes my job much easier and I would like to thank them all for their ongoing commitment. We have worked together over the last year by supporting each other and importantly supporting Frances. A great team effort! Last but not least a very big thank you to all staff and dedicated volunteers for their tireless work and commitment to the organisation.

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
TREASURERS REVIEW:

We are pleased to report that the auditors, JP Hardwick and Associates, found no matters to report during 2018-19 and their statement is attached. We thank them for their report. DIVRS has achieved a strong financial performance this financial year.

There has been a 31% increase in Grants income and 2% increase in Operating Income, resulting in a 16% increase in Total income, climbing from \$435K last year to \$507K this year. Some of the major expenses dropped dramatically, Salaries from \$277K last year to \$223K this year (20% drop), Project Expenses from \$54K to \$42K (21% drop), and Repairs, Maintenance and Cleaning from \$11K to \$5K (53% drop). Meanwhile, an increased revenue and save on major expenses allowed DIVRS to allocate more funds on more important areas such as Emergency Relief & Foodstore Expenses from \$57K last year to \$82K this year (43% increase), Computer Expenses from \$10K to 15K (44% increase), Depreciation from \$3K to \$7K (129% increase, due to the purchase of new Van).

DIVRS are in a much better financial position as of end of June 2019 compared to end of June 2018. Cash balance almost doubled from \$57K to \$129K, Net Non-current Assets from \$5K to \$56K due to the purchase of new van, and final position changed from a \$15K deficit to a \$95K surplus. Taking into consideration some of the prepaid expenses we have made, DIVRS will start off with a favourable position for 2019-20 financial year.

I would like to thank Anna Morgan who sat on the Finance Sub Committee and ensured that it provided sound advice and analysis to the Committee of Governance. A big thank you as well to our Executive Officer, Frances Trimboli, and our bookkeeper, Evan Butterworth, for their timely analysis and reporting during the year.

EXECUTIVE'S REVIEW:

The last year has been busy and rewarding on many levels. Building on the foundations developed in the previous year, we are starting to see significant progress in the quality of the DIVRS services, number of households we support, and an operational surplus to improve our financial security.

Resilience

Our ability to bounce back, strengthening through growth and knowledge

THE HIGHLIGHTS:

- DIVRS provided \$193,301.47 of direct material and aid to low income and vulnerable Darebin residents.
- DIVRS volunteers and students provided 22,652 hours of service to Darebin residents. This equates to \$611,604 of worker resource.
- DIVRS supported 855 clients in Emergency Relief of which 463 were new to our service.
- DIVRS provided 12,988 instances of assistance with material aid.
- DIVRS provided 400 hampers to the community.
- DIVRS recruited 47 new volunteers.
- DIVRS L2P provided 2,869 hours of learner driver mentoring.
- DIVRS Urban Food Fruit Squad provided 96 fruit and veg picks and distributed 2,629kgs of locally grown food to community members experiencing food insecurity.

I would like to acknowledge the productive working relationship DIVRS has developed with Darebin City Council. Council have supported the strategic goals and future plans for DIVRS. The ongoing collaboration with Darebin City Council through engagement in local network meeting, community consultation and industry forums have informed our work to develop evidence based programs and services to meet the needs of the most vulnerable in our community. We will work with council to support the relocation of our service to a premises that is fit for purpose to meet the growing needs of the community in 2020.

OUR VOLUNTEERS:

DIVRS VOLUNTEERS AND STUDENT PLACEMENTS COMBINED PROVIDED OVER 22, 652 HOURS OF SERVICE TO DAREBIN RESIDENTS.

7 volunteers and staff members successfully completed the CISVic Community Support Workers Course.

Mental Health First Aid training was delivered on site and attended by 10 volunteers and staff members.

- 7 volunteers have undertaken training for Veg Squad in seedling and vegetable production.
 - 8 new volunteers were trained in harvesting procedures.
- 10 new mentor drivers received training from Vicroads.

VOLUNTEER RECOGNITION:

This year Sue Pinchbeck celebrated 20 years of volunteering. DIVRS is in awe of Sue's outstanding commitment to DIVRS and the residents of the Darebin community. It was wonderful to honour her with a plaque for her service, a celebratory lunch and a visit from the mayor.



OUR COMMUNITY:

Our Emergency Relief Program provided 12,988 instances of material aid assistance to 855 clients, of which 463 were new clients. The total number of Emergency Relief visits in this financial year was 4666

Of the 855 clients:

95% received main source of income from Government payments, pensions or allowances


12% of the clients accessing DIVRS services identified as homeless.

3.7% were Asylum Seekers

48% identified as having a disability

10.4% identified as being Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander

38% clients currently live alone

The program is provided by over **25** volunteers who volunteer in a number of roles is including: reception, general administration, Community Support Workers, NILS (No Interest Loan Scheme) Officers, Tax Help Officers, Fresh Food Room Officers, Warehouse hands and drivers.

LONG APPOINTMENTS:

The Emergency Relief Program continues to provide clients with long appointments to assist with a variety of issues that require more time than a general appointment for a food parcel. For 2018/19 the Emergency Relief team provided approximately five appointments per week for a variety of reasons including utility bill relief, Telstra assistance and basic housing assistance.

EMERGENCY RELIEF:

2018/19 has seen the Emergency Relief Program continue to grow. Clients can access weekly food parcels, bags of fresh food and bread. During this time DIVRS delivered just under 13,000 instances of material aid averaging 350 food parcels and 358 fresh food parcels per month. This is a marked increase from 2017/18.

DIVRS VAN:

This financial year DIVRS was able to purchase a refrigerated van. This has allowed us to collect food from Foodbank and SecondBite three days a week and offer fresh food to clients every service day. We have also been able to pick up and distribute food to neighbouring agencies such as The Bridge and SPAN.





EMERGENCY RELIEF PARTNERSHIPS:

PARTNERSHIPS HAVE PLAYED A SIGNIFICANT PART IN SERVICE DELIVERY

FAMILY SERVICES:

In partnership with the Darebin City Council DIVRS piloted offering two appointments per week with a Family Social Worker. The pilot was successful and highlighted the need for having this service on site, as well as the complexity of the clients that are seen at DIVRS. This partnership will continue into the 2019/20 financial year.

KNIT ONE GIVE ONE

Knit One Give One (KOGO) provided knitted goods including blankets, jumpers and baby goods. These goods are always gratefully received and form the basis of our Homelessness Packs.

CHRISTMAS HAMPERS

400 hampers were compiled and distributed. This was possible due to donations from La Trobe University and The Life Centre Trust as well as funds provided by the Northcote Lions Club. Hampers were distributed with help from volunteers from Nelson Alexander.

ENERGY WORKSHOP

Uniting, in partnership with DIVRS, delivered two energy workshops enabling 15 clients to access the Victorian Government \$50 rebate for energy. The sessions also built the capacity of attendees to understand their energy bills and energy consumption and therefore how to best save on energy. In addition, the DIVRS volunteers who attended increased their knowledge about energy and have been able to use this both personally and with clients.



DIVRS have distributed over 100 Dignity Bags to clients. These bags contain personal care products. The program has expanded to include mother baby bags for hospital. This partnership has also provided additional sanitary and continence products.



The FruitBox's 'One Box' provided food boxes containing fresh fruit, vegetables, bread and milk to 44 families on a weekly basis. This has resulted in the distribution of over 1800 boxes this financial year.



LEARN TO DRIVE (L2P):

The L2P Program is funded by the TAC and aims to assist learner drivers aged between 16-21 years of age, who do not have access to a suitable supervisor and/or motor vehicle, to accrue the 120 hours of supervised learner driving experience required to gain their probationary licence.

The program had 78 active learners for the year and provided a total of 160 hours of professional driving lessons.

The program had 38volunteer mentors for the year providing 2,869 hours of supervised driving.

There was a total of 149Mentor/Leaner active matches made in the reporting period.



Learners gained their probationary license.

The program has supported young people from a range of diverse backgrounds, including asylum seekers, Aboriginal young people, people with a disability and people in unsecure housing.

L2P PARTNERSHIPS:

The program developed a new partnership with PRACE to target disadvantaged students in place by training a PRACE social worker as a mentor and making a car available for lessons based from PRACE. This has resulted in 7 students so far accessing the program that would not have otherwise engaged with the L2P program.

URBAN FOOD PROGRAM:

DAREBIN FRUIT ANG VEG SQUAD:

The Darebin Fruit Squad is a group of trained volunteers who harvest excess fruit from registered private and public trees in Darebin. The fruit is then distributed through the Emergency Relief Program to marginalised and vulnerable residents who have difficulty accessing nutritious food. In addition to the Darebin Fruit Squad, the aim for this year's funding was to expand the program to become the 'Darebin Fruit and Veg Squad'.

URBAN FOOD PARTNERSHIPS:

In partnership with Sustain Australia and Melbourne Farmers Markets, the Urban Food Program was allocated 32 square meters of high-profile garden beds to grow fresh food for DIVRS' Emergency Relief Program at the newly formed Melbourne Food Hub, located in Alphington. This has **doubled** the growing area for DIVRS' fresh food production to support its Emergency Relief Program, raise its profile and increase the recruitment, training and engagement of volunteers. Currently all garden beds have been planted with DIVRS seedlings by Urban Food volunteers.

PARTICIPATION IN FOOD PRODUCTION THROUGHOUT DAREBIN

- Darebin Veg Squad volunteers supported the building of East Preston Community Center's new vegetable garden by donating one tonne of DIVRS made compost. The Urban Food Program Leader participated in the construction of the garden beds.
- Moon Rabbit Café at The Bridge purchased fresh produce from the DIVRS Back Yard Basics Garden.
- Darebin Fruit Squad volunteers and households participated in 3000 Acres Olive to Oil event and contributed to its harvesting and pressing of 2,700 kg of olives.



DAREBIN VEG SQUAD SEEDLING DISTRIBUTION







As part of the Veg Squad Schools Program four schools have participated in growing DIVRS seedlings in their vegetable gardens and will be sharing the produce with DIVRS Emergency Relief Program.

This program creates an opportunity for students to learn about sustainable gardening practices and food insecurity in their community.

The participating primary schools are Preston South Primary School, Preston West Primary School, St Stephen's Primary School (Reservoir East), and St Joseph's Primary School (Northcote).





STUDENT PLACEMENT:

DIVRS has continued to work with RMIT, La Trobe
University and Melbourne Polytechnic in facilitating
student placements. In the past financial year, we have
assisted with the placements of 4 Social Work students,
3 Community Service students and 240 Nursing
students. The Nursing students have completed either
their mental health or primary care placement at DIVRS.

This placement gives students first-hand experience working with diverse clients, and in particular it gives the nursing students a better understanding of the clients they nurse in a clinical setting and the range of issues that may impact their health on discharge.

SMILE INITIATIVE:

THE SMILE PROGRAM CONSISTS OF VARIOUS ACTIVITIES THAT ENHANCE STUDENT'S LEARNING AND COLLABORATION WITHIN THE COMMUNITY IN PROMOTING HEALTH AND WELLBEING.

Health Kiosks:

The Health Kiosks operate across five agencies in Darebin, including DIVRS. They kiosks provide health assessment, education, appropriate health referrals and support services that to individuals consenting to take part in the program. Over the financial period the Health Kiosks have seen **5153** clients.

stARTalking:

stARTalking is held on a weekly basis and is free and open to the community. It was developed to improve social connection, a need that was identified through feedback from DIVRS client intake sessions and health kiosks. Nursing students and the community participate in art making and creative expression. Topics that are integrated into the program include healthy eating habits, nutrition and sense of well-being, with emphasis on mental health and physical wellness.

Teacups:

'Tea cups' provides a safe zone where all community members are welcomed to have a cup of tea and engage with the students or just enjoy the company of others.

This service was developed by the nursing students and coincides with our Emergency Relief hours.

It has provided the time for clients to develop a better understanding of the information and services that are available to them.

The Volunteer Training Pathways Program is designed to support anyone that lives, works or volunteers in the Darebin area to develop and improve their skills by providing access free pre-accredited short courses. This project is a partnership between DIVRS and local Darebin neighborhood houses The Bridge, PRACE, Jika Jika, East Preston Community Centre, SPAN and Reservoir Neighborhood House.

Since commencement in April 2019 there have been a total of **30** referrals.

There are over 20 courses to choose from, with the Retail most accessed Step Up to work 2.4% 12.2% courses being: **English** 19.5% Literacy 7.3% Carpentry 2.4% Computer classes 41.5% **MYOB** 7.3% Gardening

NO INTEREST LOANS (NILS):

The need for No Interest Loans (NILS) continues at DIVRS. We have recruited an additional NILS officer this year bringing our total to 2 volunteer NILS officers. We have hosted onsite NILS training session to build the skills of the team and to increase the number of NILS officers.

Our NILS Program remains very popular with 43 loans being approved over the past year. The loans are being used for a variety of items including: computers, household appliances and furniture and vehicle repairs.



TAX HELP:

Over the 2017/2018 finical period 45 clients being seen and assisted in completing their tax returns. This was administered by our ATO trained tax help volunteer.

Note 1: Statement of Significant Accounting Policies

This financial report is a special purpose financial report prepared in order to satisfy the financial report preparation requirements of the *Associations Incorporation Reform Act 2012*. The committee have determined that the Association is not a reporting entity.

Basis of Preparation

The report has been prepared in accordance with the following applicable Accounting Standards and Urgent Issues Group Interpretations:

AASB 101: Presentation of Financial Statements

AASB 107: Cash Flow Statements

AASB 108: Accounting Policies, Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors

AASB 110: Events after the Balance Sheet Date

AASB 1031: Materiality

AASB 1048: Interpretation and Application Standards

No other Australian Accounting Standards, International Accounting Standards Urgent Issues Group Interpretations or other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Board have been applied.

Reporting Basis and Conventions

The financial report has been prepared on an accruals basis and is based on historic costs.

The following is a summary of the material accounting policies adopted by the Association in the presentation of the financial reports. The accounting policies have been consistently applied, unless otherwise stated.

Accounting Policies

(a) Plant and Equipment

Plant and equipment are measured on the cost basis.

The carrying amount of plant and equipment is reviewed annually by directors to ensure it is not in excess of the recoverable amount from these assets. The recoverable amount is assessed on the basis of the expected net cash flows that will be received from the asset's employment and subsequent disposal. The expected net cash flows have been discounted to their present values in determining recoverable amounts.

Increases in the carrying amount arising on revaluations are credited to the revaluation reserve in equity. Decreases that offset previous increases of the same asset are charged against fair value reserves directly in equity; all other decreases are charged to the income statement. Each year the difference between depreciation based on the assets original cost is transferred from the revaluation reserve to retained earnings.

(c) Depreciation

The depreciable amount of all fixed assets, is depreciated on a diminishing value basis over their useful lives to the Association commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use.

The assets' residual values and useful lives are reviewed, and adjusted if appropriate, at each balance sheet date.

An asset's carrying amount is written down immediately to its recoverable amount if the asset's carrying amount is greater than its estimated carrying amount.

Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing proceeds with the carrying amount. These gains or losses are included in the income statement. When revalued assets are sold, amounts included in the revaluation reserve relating to that asset are transferred to retained earnings.

(d) Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and Cash Equivalents includes cash on hand, deposits held at call with banks or financial institutions, other short term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown within short term borrowings in current liabilities on the balance sheet.

(e) Comparative Figures

Comparative figures have been adjusted to conform to changes in presentation for the current financial year where required by accounting standards or as a result of changes in accounting policy, or changes to the accounting period.
